Its' a good thing Shanneyganock fans know what they like. The popular band — known for the famous party-like atmosphere at its gigs — has just released a CD that is surely to become a main staple at Newfoundland kitchen parties for years to come.


Its fast paced, catchy lyrics and downright fun-sounding tunes will sell this release to die-hard Shanneyganock fans and may even pick up a few others who get a chance to take a listen.

But if you're looking for indepth lyrics and intricate musical ability, this isn't the CD for you. Although the voice of Chris Andrews is more than capable and the accordion sounds of Mark Hiscock enjoyable, the release lacks the lusture of Shanneyganock's live performances.

Also, there's a noticeable sexual theme throughout Scallywags. Songs like *Ain't It a Beauty* (about a garden hose's capabilities) and *Twice Daily* have sexual innuendo — plain and simple. These are the kinds of tunes that make your Aunt Mabel blush and your Uncle Joe grin and elbow his buddy. Although a little juvenile, the songs are funny, to say the least. Take the lyrics from *Twice Daily*:

We had such fun in the summer sun, Lucy was quite thrilling, So sweet and pure, but I wasn't sure if that young girl was willing.

Scallywags is the follow up album to the band's Live At O'Reilly's Vol. 1. The press material for Scallywags says "if you are going to buy one party record this year, this is the one."

That is a very true statement.

It's unfortunate, though, that the band doesn't take a more serious approach to their craft because Andrews' version of the Stan Rogers classic 45 Years, about a man's love for his wife, shows the band has immense talent as well as the ability to perform ballads. Maybe they should try a little more of that.
